3. OATH OF OFFICE

The oaths were signed by Chairman Shanfield, Commissioner Jung and Commissioner Carvalho.

DISCUSS COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

Parks Project Manager Curiel said he was looking for an appointee to the Sports Field Users' Group and Appeal Committee. He explained that any sports group that might have an unresolved issue could take the issue to the Sports Field Users' Group. He explained that Manager Loya and Acting Landscape Supervisor Wayne Elms are the staff representatives and one Parks and Recreation member will fill the other spot.

Chairman Shanfield asked who would like to volunteer. Fred Jung recused himself because of a conflict of interest. Commissioner Levinson stated an interest in serving on the Sports Field Users' Group. Fred Jung nominated Commissioner Levinson.

Chairman Shanfield appointed Commissioner Levinson by consensus.

5. STATUS UPDATE OF THE SKATE PARK AT INDEPENDENCE PARK

Parks Project Manager Curiel said that it has been a successful three months since opening on June 16, 2012. Fullerton Skate Association and the Ad Hoc committee is working well with staff.

Supervisor Clements made a presentation stating that Fullerton Skate Park was closed for a few years due to gang issues and resulting problems. The subcommittee worked on creating a non-profit group named Fullerton Skateboard Association.

The subcommittee has changed the operation of the park and the new procedures proactively infiltrates the groups, making positive activity. Volunteers know the kids, and it brings a positive attitude to the park.

The site has been improved with a new fence, a new front gate, and the entrance has been moved to the front. Fullerton Skate Association has painted and cleaned up the site, making it more presentable. The area between racquetball courts was fenced off and the restroom outside the gym is open now. Fullerton Skate Association regularly power washes and paints so that Graffiti is almost non existent. A chart of volunteers has been set up. City staff monitors from 12 – 3 p.m. volunteers monitor from 3 p.m. – closing.

Fullerton Skate Association covers the cost of paint and provides free labor. Vandalism is now almost non-existent. Park has been reclaimed for the youth. Police Department Corporal John DeCaprio makes regular positive visits, continuing to cooperate with the volunteers.

Fred Jung asked what the hours of operation were. Supervisor Clements responded that technically it opens at 9 a.m. and closes at dusk. The gate is open 24 hours a day.

Karen Lang-McNabb asked about injuries. Supervisor Clements stated that reports of injuries are low.

Supervisor Clements mentioned that the subcommittee is talking with BMX riders as they are not allowed to use the skate park area. The BMX riders want to emulate what the Fullerton Skate Association has done at the skate park.

Scott Minton of the Fullerton Skate Association thanked the commission for giving them a chance. He said it is a great group of volunteers and was pleasantly surprised, as it was better than anticipated.

7. LIGHTS ON AFTER SCHOOL PRESENTATION

Manager Orozco said there are over 15 million school-aged children on their own after school. Fullerton has partnered with the After School Alliance, affordable quality after school programs. He presented a video which was filmed by a student videographer.

8. REPORT ON CITY COUNCIL AGENDA ITEMS

There were no items to report.

9. DIRECTOR'S UPDATE

Manager Loya reported that Fullerton Community Center staff has been working tirelessly. Parks Project Manager Curiel stated that over 1,000 visited on opening day. Manager Loya stated that the six preferred caterers provided free food all day and it was standing room only. The pool was a big hit. Several contract teachers demonstrated various classes on Saturday. The center was opened Sunday for three hours for participants to try the gym, pool, billiards, senior lounge and library.

Commissioner Van Gorden spoke about the church carnival on the weekend of October 13 and 14 and asked about the parking. Parks Project Manager Curiel mentioned he was at the event. He stated that the overflow will go to City Hall parking lot and there were also new parallel parking spaces along Commonwealth. The carnival workers park in the lot behind Duane Winters field. City Hall and Library parking lots were full.

Recreation Manager Mauk told the commissioners about the Oliphant political cartoonist display at Fullerton Museum which will open on October 5th. She also mentioned that October 5th is Octoboofest and the last date of the market. She informed them that the winter market is scheduled for the first week of December.

10. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Levinson said that the catering food was good on opening day at the Community Center. Chairman Shanfield asked when new commission members would be appointed and thanked staff for their great support and help over the last eight years. Staff responded that it would probably be in December.

DISCUSSION

Park & Recreation Commissioners may serve on other Ad Hoc Committees that support Park & Recreation Program. Since there are so many new Commissioners staff has provided a list of those committees with how often they meet and their purpose so you have the opportunity to see on which Committee that you would like to serve.

For this meeting it is provided as information only and will be on the agenda at the February meeting for appointments.

Park and Recreation Ad Hoc Committees

1. Sportsfield Users Group (Commissioner Levinson appointed 2012)
The Sports Field User Group meets twice a year to facilitate the fair allocation of park and school sports fields to the City's youth sports league partners The group is a collection of the current youth sports league partner presidents and their field coordinators. The meetings are led by Parks and Recreation staff and cover field allocation and maintenance, school district field issues, and provide a forum to discuss the needs and concerns of youth sports. One Parks and Recreation Commissioner is appointed to monitor the exchange and give feedback.

2. Appeals Committee (Commissioner Levinson appointed 2012)
The Appeals Committee rules on field allocation grievances between youth sports leagues. In 2005, the Parks and Recreation Commission appointed an Appeals Committee made up of three members, one Parks and Recreation Commissioner, one Parks and Recreation staff, and one Maintenance Services Department staff. The Appeals Committee rulings can be appealed to the Parks and Recreation Commission.

3. Public Art Committee

The City of Fullerton Public Art Committee, a subcommittee of the Fullerton Museum Center Association, was formed in 1996 in response to a Fullerton Transportation Center Study completed in August, 1995. This document incorporated the visions of over 100 community members involved in workshops focusing on land use, urban design, and transportation issues in the downtown. Since its inception, the committee has overseen the production of many pieces of public art, mostly murals, many of them produced as part of collaborations with the Fullerton Joint Union High School District, Fullerton School District, and other community based organizations to involve student artists in production.

The Public Art Committee is made up of representatives from the Fullerton Museum Center Association, Redevelopment Committee, Parks and Recreation Commission, the Downtown Business Association, and one atlarge member.

4. Skate Park Ad Hoc Committee

The City of Fullerton Skatepark Ad Hoc Committee provides input to staff on all issues relating to the operation, monitoring and maintenance of the Fullerton Skate Park facility. It was created at the direction of the Parks & Recreation Commission in response to the community's interest in reopening the skate park. Members are volunteers and typically come from the skating community, but it is not a requirement. The committee members are also approved City of Fullerton Adult Volunteers. As such, they assist city staff in the day to day operation, monitoring and maintenance of the skate park facility.

5. CalGrip Advisory Committee (Commissioner Fitzgerald appointed 2012) Fullerton CalGrip was implemented as a prevention and intervention program aimed at keeping at-risk youths from joining gangs and abusing drugs. The Fullerton CalGRIP Advisory Committee will be closely involved throughout the duration of the program and will conduct quarterly meetings. The Advisory Committee consists primarily of executives from private / public child and family-serving agencies, community leaders, and members of the education, business, and faith communities as well.

The Fullerton CalGRIP team will prepare quarterly information to present to the committee in order for them to understand whether the group is meeting the goals and objectives as presented in the project description. The City will be held accountable to the stated goals. This group will also provide leadership, advice and referrals for any needs expressed by City staff.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this agenda letter is to have the Parks and Recreation Commission review the update of Resolution No. 6278 regarding naming public parks and recreation facilities.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the amended updates to Resolution No. 6278 and recommend its adoption by City Council.

PROPOSED COST

None

DISCUSSION

Resolution No. 6278 was adopted in 1977 to guide the Parks and Recreation Commission in naming public parks and recreation facilities. During a review of a sports field naming request, at the October Parks and Recreation Commission, it was not clear as to what the definition of a recreation facility was and what the parameters were for naming one. Resolution No. 6278 focused mainly on the naming of parks but gave little guidance for facilities.

A recreation facility is a place designed to provide a recreational service or fulfill a recreational need. A recreation facility could be a building, sports field, lake, trail, or skateboard park to name just a few possibilities. In addition, a recreation facility could contain multiple recreational component/facilities inside. A community center is a recreational facility that houses many separate areas that qualify as recreation facilities on their own. For example, a community center could contain classrooms, fitness

rooms, swimming pools, gymnasiums, galleries, and courtyards. All of these facilities may be named separately.

The changes to the resolution are as follows:

PRINCIPLES

- 2. Public Community-parks and recreation facilities and those neighborhood parks not adjacent to a school may be named:
 - (a) After California native trees
 - (b) After significant leaders and events in the history of Fullerton, State of California or United States of America.
 - (c) After individuals or groups that dedicate services, land, facilities or funds to the City of Fullerton.
 - (d) To describe the flora of the area, or any unique or distinct geographical or environmental location.
 - (e) After prominent individuals with a Fullerton connection that represent or exemplify a highly-valued ideal to be commemorated.

RESOLUTION NO. 6278

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FULLERTON ADOPTING CERTAIN POLICY, OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPLES, AS A GUIDE FOR THE NAMING OF PUBLIC PARKS AND RECREATION FACILITIES.

THIS resolution supercedes and cancels resolution #5028 and all prior naming policies.

WHEREAS, there is a need to establish a uniform procedure to name public parks and recreation facilities; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Fullerton City Council that the following policy, objectives and principles relating to the naming of public parks and recreation facilities hereby are adopted as a guide.

POLICY

The City of Fullerton Park and Recreation Commission shall assume the responsibility for the naming of all public parks and recreation facilities within the corporate limits of the City of Fullerton. They will review all recommended names and make their recommendations to the City Council for the Council's review and final adoption.

OBJECTIVES

- To establish a uniform procedure regarding the naming of existing and future parks and recreational facilities which will assure good taste and community compatibility.
- To name parks and recreational facilities so they will be easily identified and compliment the area in which they are located.
- To encourage the dedication of land or funds for public recreational use by individuals or groups to perpetuate their names in a useful manner, such as a public park or recreational facility.

PRINCIPLES

- All neighborhood parks which are adjacent to schools may be named after the school.
- Community parks and those neighborhood parks not adjacent to a school be named:
 - (a) After California native trees.
 - (b) After significant leaders and events in the history of Fullerton, State of California or United States of America.
 - (c) After individuals or groups that dedicate services, land, facilities or funds to the City of Fullerton.
 - (d) To describe the flora of the area, or any unique or distinct geographical or environmental location.
- Park names should not be similar in sound or spelling to avoid confusing identification.
